As I begin my second year as Principal of Marian Central Catholic High School, I look back at what we have already accomplished as well as what we are looking to implement moving forward.

First, on a personal note, I cannot tell you how grateful I am that the Marian family and community has welcomed me with open arms. As I have told my wonderful staff time and again, I have found my home with Marian. We have an outstanding "staffulty" that is continuously focused on what is best for our students spiritually, academically, physically, emotionally, and socially. It is this commitment that will propel us into the limitless opportunities for Marian Central's future.

The 2016-17 school year came with its share of challenges, but overwhelmingly outnumbered by the great things that occurred at Marian. Father Doyle graciously stepped in as Interim Superintendent, Mrs. Loy as Asst. Our new Innovative Design and Entrepreneurial Applications (IDEA) class is focusing on the lean business model for entrepreneurship through the INCubatoredu® Program and has connected dozens of community businessmen and women with our students.

Finally, to deliver the highest level of educational rigor balanced with our Catholic Identity our school has to offer, our teachers are continuously learning through conferences, workshops, and inservices focused on aligning the curriculum and developing clear and concise learning objectives. Additionally, all teachers and administrators are working their way through Catechist Certification in order to better enhance our spiritual imprint on our students' lives.

I am certainly looking forward to what this new school year will bring and I promise you that the decisions we make here at Marian will be approached with the upmost respect for our Catholic beliefs and the expectations that our school be in the forefront of education. Former MC Athletic Director Inducted into Coach Hall of Fame

Longtime Woodstock resident and former athletic director of Marian Central Catholic High School, Hans Rokus was inducted into the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association's Hall of Fame in May as a Friend of Basketball for his work in coaching and broadcasting.

Rokus was nominated by former colleague and friend, Bruce Firchau, who coached for Harvard High School in the 1980's.

"Hans has always been community based," Firchau said. "He's given an awful lot of himself to Marian Central in basketball as a coach and also as media, in terms of broadcasting, doing color, and doing announcing for basketball games throughout McHenry County. He's done that for decades. I thought we had lost track of Hans. He had fallen through the cracks and is very deserving to go into the Hall of Fame for his years of service."

"It's a nice, nice honor," Rokus said. "I've been around the game of basketball for over 50 years as a player, as a coach, as an administrator, as a broadcaster. I'm going to enjoy it with my family. It's a culmination of many, many years being involved in the game I love."

> Rokus attended St. Thomas High School in Rockford from 1959 to 1962 where he played basketball. The school closed in the spring of 1962, and Rokus has the distinction to have scored the last two points for the school. He attended Rockford Boylan High School his senior year.

Rokus received partial scholarships for basketball and tennis at Northern Illinois University. He played both sports his freshman year, but a collapsed lung kept him from competing again until his senior year when he returned to the tennis court.

The injury opened other opportunities for Rokus, who coached two eight-grade teams while at NIU-St. Mary's in DeKalb and St. Patrick in Rockford. "I knew I wanted to be a basketball coach," Rokus said. "I loved the game as a player."

Rokus' former coach at Rockford Boylan hired Rokus at Marian Central after he graduated from NIU. He was the boys' sophomore and varsity assistant coach for 10 years and took over as the boy's varsity head coach and athletic director in 1977. He stayed in that job until 1985 and also coached tennis and cross-country. He retired as athletic director in 1992.

Firchau coached against Rokus during his last high school game as head coach at Marian Central in 1985. The Hornets, who were ranked fourth in the state, led 11-0 going in to the fourth quarter, but the Hurricanes got hot and almost pulled off the upset, losing 21-19.

"Harvard beat us by 50 points in January, and I told the team if we played them again we would hold the ball," Rokus said. "We just passed the ball. We had no inkling to run an offense. ...To this day when I bring that game up, Bruce starts swearing at me."

Rokus' broadcasting career began in the late 1960s with WIVS out of Crystal Lake with a Saturday morning show and basketball color commentating. He stopped in the early 1970s because of his workload at Marian Central. He returned to broadcasting in the 1980s with WMCW in Harvard, covering basketball and football, and is currently a volunteer broadcaster at WHIW-LP in Harvard.

Rokus said he had many people to thank but pointed to two individuals he said made a huge difference – Tom Blenner, who played basketball for Rokus in the 1960s and then was his top assistant coach starting in 1974; and Scott Padjen, who has been Rokus' radio partner for the last 24 years.

The induction ceremony was held May 6, 2017, at Redbird Arena in Normal.

Mr. Kevin DeVries has served as a mathematics teacher at Marian Central for 16 years. He graduated from Eastern Illinois University with a Bachelor's Degree in Education, majoring in Mathematics. Before coming to Marian Central, Mr. DeVries

Mr. DeVries was often seen at Marian Central fine arts and athletic events cheering on the students and supporting his fellow staff members. The Marian Central community has been fortunate to have Mr. DeVries as a faculty member and supporter for the past 16 years. 

Marian Central has launched **IDEA/INCubatoredu**!

This IDEA/INCubatoredu@mcchs is a course is designed to get students excited about becoming true entrepreneurs. Students will have the opportunity to create and fully develop their own product or service. Student teams will work through the process of ideation, market research, and business plan development. The program utilizes volunteers from the community to aid in this process.

Students will learn about marketing, accounting, human resources, as well as the legal aspects of running a business. This is a hands-on course designed to allow students to imagine, design, construct, market, and refine their own business ventures. They will work not only with the instructor but business mentors and coaches of the business community. Over the course of the two semesters, students develop a business model canvas, gain market input on a minimum viable product, and continually revise all elements to improve their business model. Students acquire foundational business concepts, then apply those concepts to the team's new business idea. Principles from the Lean movement help students test their thinking. From Concept to Minimum Viable Product to Pitch, students are hypothesizing, testing, adapting and learning. Importantly, they work and learn in teams.

Have you heard of "The Bombers" as part of Marian Central's history?

It all started back in 1959 when boys, mostly from Crystal Lake, but also including Woodstock, McHenry, and Harvard, were recruited to Marian Central by football coach, Tom Parsley. There were a total of 14 students who transferred from the surrounding towns. Even though they would be ineligible to play their first year at Marian (their sophomore year) due to the transfer rule, Coach Parsley was still able to convince them to transfer.

Because the school was not yet completed, the kids were shocked when they were driven over and saw that there was no gym, no showers, and worst of all, no football field. They had to use St. Mary's facilities, including their football field and lockers.

In spite of their ineligibility to be on the team, they were able to practice with the players and were anxiously waiting to be eligible to play with them the following year (their junior year). They were able to ride on the team bus and dress for games along with the rest of the team. Practices were hard, as they took their roles very seriously. *The Bombers* offered tough competition, encouragement, and added real strength to the team.

There was an organized scrimmage game at the end of the season and *The Bombers* beat the team 6-0, in a blizzard! A good time was had by all.

Marian's record their first year *without The Bombers* was 1 win and 9 losses. Marian's record their second year *with The Bombers* help was 5 wins and 5 losses. And Marian's record their third year *with The Bombers* was 6 wins and 4 losses.


2017 Hurricane Award


