
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

INTERVIEW WITH MS. ERIN CARVER

What is your favorite memory from teaching at Marian Central? Although there are too many favorite memories to write about during her 30 years at Marian Central, Ms. Erin Carver recalls just some of her favorites.

•When the Harry Potter books were popular, Mrs. Larsen and I invented a Quidditch game for the freshmen and sophomores. The students brought their own capes and hats, and we supplied the small brooms. The kids had a great time.

•Taking both the boys and girls golf teams to the State tournaments. What happened at Illinois State University and Decatur stays at Illinois State University and Decatur!

•Lunches in the faculty room with other faculty members. You would be surprised how crazy and silly teachers can be when they are away from the students. A little bit of advice...never eat black frosting before you return to class! •During the first few days of learning CPR, I would play different music so the students would perform compressions with the right tempo. A couple favorite songs are, "Another One Bites the Dust" and "Stayin' Alive." Instead of counting the compressions, they would be singing. One Halloween, a student was dressed as a rooster while performing CPR.

•Becoming a member of the 100% Club for CPR. Heimlich and unconscious choking are very hard maneuvers to learn. You must perform each skill perfectly and score a 95% or above on the written test. I've always loved when students, who've struggled academically, performed the skills perfectly and earned their place on the wall.

•The students had to make a First Aid/Wounds video that included all types of wounds. Some favorite videos of mine have been when a student and his crew went to a local playground to show how unsafe the playground could be. Another favorite video of mine was when a student dressed up as Santa Claus and drove construction equipment to show how easy it is to have an accident.

What sports have you coached while at Marian?

The first year I was at Marian, back in 1991, I coached both volleyball and cheerleading in the fall and track in the spring. I coached both the freshmen and sophomore volleyball teams from 1991-2005. During those years, we had several great varsity teams. Our trips to state tournaments provided great memories and experiences for both the players and coaches. I was the first coach of the girls soccer program in 1994. The first girls game of the season was the first game of soccer I ever saw! I had a lot to learn. I coached girls JV and Varsity soccer from 2002-2004. I went on to coach both the boys and girls golf teams from 2006-2020. There is a big difference between coaching a team sport and coaching an individual sport. One of my favorite seasons was this last one. Due to COVID, several girls from the volleyball team played golf. Because of their team sport experience, they showed their golf teammates what it means to be a member of a true team. They were a great group of girls and provided some great memories during a difficult time.

Who is Longfellow, the whale?

Longfellow was a program sponsored by the Red Cross. The focus of the program was teaching water safety to first and second graders. Several sophomores took the training and then went to several of the local grade schools to teach the information they learned during the training. The program mascot was Longfellow, the whale. The Red Cross purchased a Longfellow costume for us to use. Picture a very large blue whale wearing orange bathing trunks, a lifeguard hat, and a whistle. The Red Cross wanted Longfellow to "perform" at the presentations. The person who wore the costume had to be an adult, which was

get in and out of the costume and direct me to the correct location. I was told, "don't worry about the heat, there is a fan in the head to keep you cool." There was a fan in the costume, but in all my years as Longfellow, the whale, it never worked! The presentations were always done on the hottest days of the school year. I had to keep cold water bottles in the legs of the costume.

What are your plans for retirement?

Before COVID, I had plans to travel and do all the things on my ever-growing bucket list. Not knowing what is going to happen, I'm taking a wait-and-see attitude. In the meantime, I have plenty of projects at home that can finally be started.

What will you miss the most about Marian?


I will miss my department members the most. Over the past 30 years, Marian has had the greatest people and teachers who have been members of the P.E. Department. We always got along and truly enjoyed working together. I will miss my students and the look on their faces when they finally "get it" or perform a skill they never thought they could do; that is what teaching is all about. I will miss Marian. The day-to-day activities, walking the halls, talking with other faculty members and students, waving to kids in other classes as I walk by, Marian Masses, getting ready each day, the gyms, the wonderful women who work in the main office, the maintenance crew,

and my office located in the girls' locker room.

What are your greatest achievements here at Marian?

Excluding my first year in 1991, I have taught all sophomore students at Marian. I estimate that I have taught about 4,500 students at Marian. Except for this year, due to COVID, ALL those students had the opportunity to be certified by the Red Cross. I started the Rescuer Wall of Fame in 2000. Students come into First Aid class thinking that it's all about performing CPR on someone, delivering babies, broken bones, blood, and gore. Many of the students say that they will never feel comfortable giving first aid. I wanted to show them that first aid can be as simple as making a phone call or sitting with someone, keeping them calm until help arrives. The rule was if you do something that MIGHT have saved a life, then you belong on the Rescuer Wall of Fame. Currently, there are over 100 crosses on the wall explaining what the students did to help during an emergency. From sitting with an elderly woman who scraped her knee when she fell down the stairs to a student giving CPR to an infant in a grocery store. One student was on the cross-country team and gave up her chance to win State to help a runner from another school who was unable to run any further. Two years ago, we started a Pet Rescuer Wall of Fame. The first student to make that wall saved her choking guinea pig by doing an improvised version of the Heimlich maneuver.





Alumni Awards & Hall of Fame

On Thursday, January 28, 2021, the Development Office had the honor, at a virtual ceremony, to recognize three Alumni Award winners: Kent Cooney '69, Scott Smith '94, and Patrick McDonald '02. Additionally, Marian inducted five individuals into the Hall of Fame: Kailey (Husby) Walter '04, Tori Stock '09, Jon Budmayr '09, Erin (McConnell) Widmayer '92, and Coach Laura Watling. Even though we couldn't be together in person, we were honored to have the opportunity to recognize our Alumni Award winners and Hall of Fame inductees.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI RECIPIENT

KENT COONEY'69 is currently an independent director at the Chicago Rivet and Machine Company, director and officer at Woodstock Country Club, and director and owner of Kingston Lanes in Woodstock. In addition to volunteering and being a board member and director of many organizations, he worked as a partner at a national accounting firm for 21 years and retired as the director of Chicagoland Financial Service Group in 1997. From 2002 through 2007, he was the founding executive director for The Community Foundation for McHenry County, which now has a \$35 million endowment and annually grants \$2 million to county non-profits. Mr. Cooney states, "My greatest accomplishment is my four children: Brandy, Jordan, Cole, and Alexe, all Marian graduates who have gone on to become thoughtful, wonderful people and parents. For that, I am blessed and humbled."

ALUMNI EXCELLENCE AWARD

SCOTT SMITH '94 is currently the co-owner of Alpha Infrastructure Partners. In 2016, he was voted Best Under 40 by the Northwest Herald, and in 2017, one of his companies, Miller Formless, received the Business Champion award from the McHenry County Economic Development Corporation. Mr. Smith volunteered at Home of the Sparrow from 2011 through 2017 and acted as president from 2015 through 2017. He has also been active with Marian Central and Marquette's Alumni Associations.

PATRICK McDONALD '02 was recognized for multiple combat deployments to Iraq as a United States Marine and we thank him for his service to our country. While in the Marines, he received the Good Conduct Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, two Iraqi Campaign Medals, Combat Action Ribbon, and a Sea Service Deployment Medal. Mr. McDonald is the Director of Sales at WISC-TV in Madison, Wisconsin.

KAILEY (HUSBY) WALTER '04 played soccer during an exciting time in Marian Central history. During her sophomore year, Kailey was a starter on the first IHSA Regional Championship team. Her teams helped start a string of three consecutive IHSA Regional Championships. Her class graduated as one of the most decorated and successful classes in girls soccer history. The 14 team wins in both her junior and senior year tied the school record for the most in one season. Kailey went on to play at Viterbo University receiving many academic and athletic awards. She was recruited by the U.S. Soccer Federation as a Senior Human Resources Generalist. The U.S. Soccer Federation is the governing body of soccer in the United States and develops the national team for World Cup play.

JONATHAN BUDMAYR '09 was a four-year starting quarterback for the Marian Central football team. He led his team to the Class 5A State title game as a sophomore and the State Semifinals as a junior. Jon holds Marian Central records with most completions and most passing yards in his high school career. He is 4th overall in passing touchdowns and 5th overall in passing yards during one season. Jon was ranked #1 quarterback in Illinois, #10 player in the state, and 17th best pro-style player quarterback in the nation by Rivals. He was ranked in ESPNU's top 150 and MaxPreps top 100. He was also ranked as the #52 player in the Midwest. He was All-Area honorable mention as a freshman, team MVP, First-Team All-Area and All-Conference as a sophomore, and First-Team All-Conference and two-time Chicago Sun-Times Player of the Week selection as a junior. His last healthy full season of football came in his junior year with the Hurricanes when he took them to the Class 5A playoff semifinals. In that season he missed four games with a hamstring injury, but he returned to throw for more than 1,000 yards in four playoff games. Jon's senior season at Marian Central lasted one quarter when he suffered a broken collarbone in the opener. Jon's injuries did not stop him from receiving a Division 1 scholarship to the University of Wisconsin, where he went on to be the quarterbacks coach.




VICTORIA STOCK '09 was one of the most accomplished female golfers in Marian Central history. She was a varsity letter winner and McHenry County Champion all four years. Tori was a three-time winner of the Northwest Herald's Girls Golfer of the Year award. During her time at Marian Central, she won two IHSA Regionals and competed at the State final all three years. Her best finish at State Finals was 13th place during her junior year. Tori went on to play at the University of Minnesota where she earned two varsity letters.

FRIEND OF MARIAN, ERIN (McCONNELL) WIDMAYER'92 has volunteered countless hours to help promote Marian Central Athletics, including being a member of the Hall of Fame Committee. As the head of the Art Department for 23 years, Erin makes posters for every senior student-athlete. She has volunteered her time to work at numerous sporting events. Whenever needed, she is always there to answer the call. Marian Central Athletics has played a role in Erin's life since high school, where she played softball and volleyball. Upon her return, she coached volleyball for six years, was assistant coach and head coach for girls golf, and coached softball for 18 years. She was voted the Northwest Herald's Softball Coach of the Year in 2005.

COACH LAURA WATLING is the winningest coach in Marian Central volleyball history. She spent 17 years as a volleyball coach, nine years as an assistant varsity coach under Deb Rakers, and eight years as head varsity coach. As head coach, her team won eight Regional Championships (most of any Marian coach and won every year she was the head coach), six Sectional Championships (most of any Marian coach), and four Super-Sectional Championships. Her team finished 3rd at State in 2010, 2nd at State in 2011 and 2016, and were State Champions in 2015. Coach Watling was a four-time Northwest Herald Volleyball Coach of the Year and ESCC Conference Coach of the Year in 2016. During her 8-year tenure as head coach, 15 players went on to play volleyball in college, nine at the Division 1 level.

Rev. Michael Fuller



REV. MICHAEL FULLER, of Washington, D.C., was appointed Associate General Secretary of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) on November 19, 2020. Father Fuller, a priest of the Diocese of Rockford, has served as executive director of the USCCB's Secretariat of Doctrine and Canonical Affairs since August 2016. He will continue to lead the secretariat while also serving as administrator of pastoral offices and member of the executive staff. Prior to his service at the USCCB, Father Fuller was an instructor, assistant professor, and chair of the Department of Christian Life (2002-2011), and then became an associate professor and chair of the Department of Spiritual Theology at the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary (2011-2016). He was editor of the Chicago Studies Theological Journal (2012-2016). He served as spiritual director and instructor for the Diaconate Formation Program of the Diocese of Rockford. He taught at the Institute for Priestly Formation at Creighton University (2004-2008) and was an instructor in Health Care Ethics at Saint Anthony School of Nursing in Rockford, Illinois (1998-2000). He also served as associate pastor of St. Bridget Parish in Loves Park, Illinois (1997-2000). Father Fuller holds a Doctorate in Sacred Theology, He also holds a Master of Divinity, a Licentiate of Sacred Theology, and a Bachelor of Sacred Theology from the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary. He was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Rockford in 1997. Prior to entering seminary formation, Father Fuller spent two years in Swaziland, Africa, as a Peace Corps volunteer. Father Fuller has written extensively in numerous scholarly publications and is the author of two books: Daily Prayer 2008 and The Virgin Martyrs: A Hagiographical and Mystagogical Interpretation.

Lcdr Bethany Busch

LCDR BETHANY BUSCH, of Belleville, IL, is a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Navy. She received her commission through the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps (NROTC) program in December 2001. While attending the University of Illinois, Bethany participated in the Navy Marine Mammal Internship Program and earned a Bachelor of Science in animal sciences. Her initial assignment was Communications Officer on the USS HAYLER (DD 997), conducting counter drug operations off the western coast of South America. Upon the decommissioning of USS HAYLER, she then reported as the Engineering Training Officer on the USS KAUFFMAN (FFG 59), supporting Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom from the Arabian Sea. Having completed her initial sea tours, Bethany was assigned as a lead instructor for the International Surface Warfare Officer School in Newport, Rhode Island, educating U.S. and International Officers in maritime strategy, tactics, and operations. During her time as an instructor, she also fulfilled an Individual Augmentation assignment with a Joint Special Operations Task Force in Balad, Iraq, where she served as the Force Manager for over ten thousand service members in Iraq, Afghanistan, and the Horn of Africa. Upon return from her assignment to Iraq, Bethany headed the development and implementation of the Surface Warfare Officer Introduction Course, piloted in December 2008. As a Department Head, she served as the Commissioning Chief Engineer on the USS SPRUANCE (DDG 111) and was acting Executive Officer during all extended leave periods. She was then hand selected to serve as the Readiness Officer N7 ("N" designates special forces and the "7" refers to the highest level of proficiency) on the DESRON (Destroyer Squadron) 23 and embarked on the USS NIMITZ as the Sea Combat Commander. Bethany then served as the Chief of Staff during a gap in the Deputy Commodore billet while conducting operations in Fifth Fleet with the NIMITZ Strike Group. As the Operations Officer (N3), she was directly responsible for planning and executing numerous multi-national exercises and operations for multiple surface combatants. Bethany assumed command of the USS WHIRLWIND (PC 11) in July 2014, deployed in Bahrain. While in command, USS WHIRLWIND earned a Meritorious Unit Commendation. In 2016, she reported to Navy Expeditionary Combat Forces Central/Task Force 56 as the Readiness Officer (N7), where she was responsible for the management of sustained readiness for 9 subordinate task groups, totaling over 1,000 personnel, and the CTF (Commander, Task Force) 56 staff of 44. Bethany served as the Operations Analysis and Assessments Branch Chief and is currently the Joint Exercises Branch Chief at U.S. Transportation Command. Bethany has led the United

States Transportation Command worldwide COVID-19 response efforts as the Chief of Staff for the COVID-19 Task Force. The U.S. Transportation Command executed the first ever global repatriation of U.S. citizens from other countries as the borders closed and delivered life-saving equipment and protective gear to medical facilities across the country and Europe. They were able to transport critically ill patients utilizing specially designed transportation units. Bethany holds an MBA from Colorado Technical University. Her personal decorations include the Joint Service Commendation Medal (2), Navy Commendation Medal (7), Navy Achievement Medal (3) and various unit and campaign ribbons. After twenty years of service to our country as an Officer in the U.S. Navy, Bethany will be retiring in January 2022.


HURRICANE DAY





